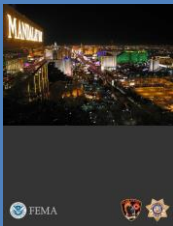
JESIP Embedding Workshops

LAS VEGAS SHOOTING OCTOBER 2017

1 October After Action Report



It has been almost a year since the shooting in Las Vegas which resulted in the deaths of 58 people and leaving over 850 injured, including responders. The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) has produced a report in conjunction with the Clark County Fire Department and the Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department following the incident. The report cites 2 of the 3 key conclusions as recommendations regarding interoperability and the effect it has on a response. Furthermore, it emphasises the importance of multi-agency interoperability during planning, training and exercising to ensure robust procedures are in place.

JOL ONLINE ACTIVITY

This section of the newsletter highlights some of the lessons identified and notable practice that you have uploaded onto JOL Online.

LESSON IDENTIFIED LI01322

It has been identified that B.A.S.E jumpers have been illegally accessing tall transmission towers. There have been numerous sightings across the UK and it has been decided that site specific risk assessments for high frequency sites will be shared by the national grid with blue lights.

LESSON IDENTIFIED

LI01323

An incident where a fire caused overhead high voltage cables to break and fall onto the ground has resulted in a change to internal processes for the Fire and Rescue Service and an update to National Grid procedures?. All responding agencies should maintain and discuss continual situational awareness throughout an incident to highlight any risks and act accordingly.

LESSON IDENTIFIED

LI01121

During a HAZMAT incident, communication between a transport operator and the emergency services was delayed, this resulted in an unsuitable replacement vehicle to transport hazardous material which delayed the resolution of the incident.

NOTABLE PRACTICE

NP01210

Following an incident involving a large fire, a fire and rescue service has provided their LRF with a Memorandum of Understanding for the use of the UAV for partner agencies. The MOU is hosted on Resilience Direct, detailing it's capabilities, activation, relevant legislation and multi-agency access to footage in order to improve shared situational awareness amongst responder agencies during an incident.

JOL SINGLE POINTS OF CONTACT

JOL SPoCs have to be authorised by the Police, Fire, Ambulance or LRF/EPGs Strategic Lead so any requests via JOL Online will be checked with these leads by the JOL Coordinator before the request is accepted.

It is the responsibility of the JOL SPoC to ensure all relevant information is shared with staff within their organisation, including the JOL Online Monthly, so please share with anyone who could benefit from this information.

JOL PROCESS

This diagram explains the process that each lesson takes from identification through to publication.

As you can see, the work does not end once you press submit, this is only the beginning of the steps taken to improve interoperability during incidents.
